Style Guide for Citing Sources Grades 6-8

General Guidelines for Citing Sources:

- References are listed on a page that is separate from the main body of work.
- Title the page **Works Cited** (with NO quotation marks, underlining or italics), centered on the top of the first page.
- The Works Cited list should be alphabetized by the author's last name.
- References are double-spaced within and between entries.
- *Italicize* titles of books and journals.
- If the citation is more than one line long, indent the second line and each successive line within the citation.
- URLs are not required when citing web publications, but when the reader most likely will not be able to find the source without it, it should be included.
- This guide shows the most frequently used types of citations. If you have questions, as your teacher or the school librarian.
